MISS WOOD AND MISS EVENS ATTAIN HIGHEST SCHOLASTIC HONORS IN CLASS OF 1968

The announcement of Miss Daisy Wood as valedictorian and Miss Sally Evens as salutatorian has been made by Supervising Principal Stuart M. Townsend.

Miss Wood is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Wood of Hadley. Her school activities have included membership in the National Honor Society for three terms, serving as president in both her junior and senior years. A member of the Future Teachers of America 1,2,3, serving as president 2,3; twirlers 1,2; chorus 1,2,3; president 3. Daisy served as student council secretary in her third year, and is president of this organization in her senior year. She was a cheerleader in grades 10, 11 and 12, and played a lead in the school play in her second and third years. Last year she represented the Legion Auxiliary at Girls State. Miss Wood has been accepted at the State University of New York at Albany.

Miss Evens is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Evens of Lake Luzerne. Her school activities included membership in the National Honor Society for three years, serving as treasurer in her junior year and vice president in her senior year. Sally was student council representative in her first year; a member of the Future Teachers of America in her second and third years; serving as secretary in her third year. A cheerleader for four years, Sally was captain of the varsity group, class secretary in her sophomore year, and is the student council treasurer in her senior year. She has been a member of 4H for eight years. SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM AT HLCS IS BIG BUSINESS EIGHTY LOAVES OF BREAD USED FOR ONE MEAL

Have you ever wondered what your child is eating today for school lunch? Have you ever thought about why a hot school lunch is served to the children?

Did you know that it takes 75-80 long pullman loaves of bread to make 1500 sandwiches of grilled cheese or tuna salad for one meal? Or that it takes 120 dozen dinner rolls for one meal? Or that it takes 140 pounds of ground beef and tomato sauce and 40 pounds of spaghetti to make spaghetti and meat sauce for one meal for our students? Or that it takes 130 pounds of cabbage for cole slaw for one meal?

Quite a lot of food for one meal, isn't it? Is your kitchen big enough to think big food amounts like this for a single meal? Hadley-Luzerne School Lunch Program serves a type A school lunch. The aims of this program are: 1. to serve wholesome lunches that provide at least one-third of the daily nutritional requirements. 2. to improve child nutrition necessary for physical and mental health. 3. to establish good eating habits and learn to eat different kinds of food necessary for all growing children.

According to the requirements of the New York State School Lunch Program a type A lunch must include as a minimum 2 ounces of cooked protein, 3/4 cup fruits and/or vegetables in two or more items, 1 serving of bread (plus 2 tsp. butter) and one-half pint of milk. Servings to younger children may be reduced to their wants from 3/4 to 7/8 of type A requirements.

PRESENT MANAGEMENT

Successful management of a school lunch program starts with menu planning. In order to help increase participation in the lunch program menus must be planned that are pleasing to the children. At the same time the control of food and labor cost must be kept in mind.

SENIORS VISIT WASHINGTON

Forty-seven seniors and their four chaperones, Mr. Donald Racette, Mr. and Mrs. John Pickens, and Mrs. Evelyn Lockwood, all left for Washington, D.C. April 20 for four nights and five days of visiting the nation's Capitol. For the third consecutive year the HLCS students joined students from Westport for the annual senior trip.

The Class of 1969 provided a hearty breakfast to send the seniors on their way at 8:00 A.M. April 20. The students visited the Gettysburgh Area in late afternoon touring the battlefields and witnessing the Electric map at Gettysburgh museum. After dinner in Washington, the students went to the Sheraton Motor Inn at Alexandria, Virginia, their home base for the trip.

Sunday morning, the 21st, transportation was furnished so that they could attend the church of their worship. After church they visited the U.S. Capitol for a guided tour followed by a visit to the Supreme Court and the Library of Congress. The National Gallery of Art, the Smithsonian Museum, Museum of Natural History and the Space and Rocket Center were visited after lunch.

Monday the group stopped at the Bureau of Printing and Engraving for a conducted tour and then climbed the Washington Monument. A tour of the White House climaxed this busy morning. After lunch the class visited the FBI building and the National Geographic exhibit. A night tour of Washington including stops at the Jefferson Memorial, Lincoln Memorial, and the Archives Building ended the busy day.

Tuesday morning everyone visited the Arlington National Cemetery to see the changing of the Guard at the Tombs of the Unknown Soldiers and the Kennedy Gravesite. Next they visited the Marine Memorial depicting the flag raising at Iowa Jima. The bus then took the group to Mount Vernon where they visited the home of George Washington. In the afternoon stops were made at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception and the National Episcopal Cathedral. After a dinner there was a moonlight sail down the Potomac River on the Wilson Line Boat.

The morning of the 24th the seniors began the jaunt home ending a most memorable excursion for all involved.

The cafeteria staff are members of the Tri County School Food Service Association and the New York State Food Service Association. At the present time three members of the staff are officers of the Tri County Association: Henrietta Lesson, secretary; Elizabeth Backus, historian; and Joan Waite, news reporter for Tri County "Quotes and Quips" paper.

In addition to the Type A school lunch the cafeteria staff also supervises the supplemental milk program for grades K-6, and the Breakfast Program. The Breakfast Program is prepared daily at the Queen Anne by and for the thirty special students who attend classes at the Queen Anne. This program includes orange juice, bread, butter, peanut butter, and milk.

In addition to all this, the cafeteria staff helps with many other programs in the school. Set-ups for PTA meetings, faculty meetings, the teacher seminars, and others. Each group who comes in contact with these "ladies in white" in the cafeteria is most grateful for all that is done.

THE PAST YEARS

But perhaps in your mind you are thinking back to the old days when the school lunch began in 1942 under WPA. Mrs. Peter Burnham was cook and food was prepared on the stoves in the homemaking rooms and served in bowls in classrooms. Dishes were washed and scalded in the sinks in the homemaking rooms. As the program expanded, Mrs. Eva Reynolds became cook here in the village and Mrs. Irma Salmon in Conklingville school. Food was transported and served at the Odd Fellows Hall, Fire House School, and over Frank's Market School. The students carried food in large gallon milk cans, and apple boxes of bowls and spoons.

At long last came the day when the new cafeteria was opened, and the first dietitian, Mrs. Violet Patience Swart, was hired to supervise the school lunches. Mrs. Marjorie Fyfe replaced Mrs. Swart and Mrs. Fyfe retired from the job last fall.

Perhaps you can reminisce and add some other names of former workers or add some other phase of the school lunch program. It is well to think back in order to appreciate what we have today. Yes?

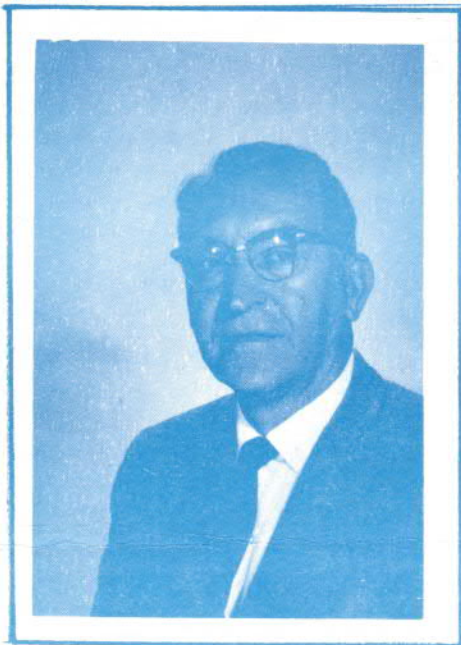
MARY LOU ORDWAY

Best known of Mr. Friedman's projects is the daily capsule radio report, Education Panorama, which is aired over some seventy stations of the state during a fall and spring series.
