At the opening of the meeting, Arthur Brown, served as chairman and introduced the speakers. Mr. Brown stated that-- "This dream of a library for Hadley-Lake Luzerne area had been in the back of my mind for some time, and now it is in the foreground. I began talking, asking, thinking, and dreaming this for the community several years ago. Many people listened, talked, dreamed and cooperated. This meeting is the first of many similar ones which will eventuate in a library."

BASKETBALL PLAYERS PREPARE FOR BUSY SEASON

Forty-five boys tried out for basketball this year. This was one of the biggest turnouts in the history of the school. Of the original 45, only 29 made the grade. This again is more than is usually kept on a junior varsity and varsity basketball squad. Because of the extra large turnout, it took Coaches Hanlon and Decker more than a week to complete the cut.

This year Coach Hanlon has seven seniors on the squad, four of which are returning lettermen, and five juniors. Of the seven seniors, Ron White, Tom Fitzgerald, and Cliff Carlton have three years experience in varsity basketball. Juniors who are looking real good in practice and in games this year are Bill White, Bill Ives, and Bob Haak.

In their first outing this year, Luzerne traveled to Warrensburg for what was said to be the best game in the area that night. It was really an exciting game and bench strength, Bob Haak, scored 11 points in less than a quarter of relief, and accuracy at the free throw line proved to be the difference and our boys came home with a big victory.

The following week Bolton came down from the hills, fresh from a victory over Argyle and ready to give Luzerne a real test. The gym was packed with fans from both Bolton and Luzerne and there was standing room only, and very little of that left. With only 30 seconds remaining in the game, Luzerne led by one point, and then Bolton tied it up with a free throw to send it into a three minute overtime period. Kip Moses and Bill White scored a basket in the overtime period and Luzerne walked off a winner again.

If the first two games are any indication of the season ahead, the fans are advised to get to the games early to find a seat, and to bring along a bottle of aspirin to calm their nerves!

Home games start at 6:45 on Friday nights and 6:30 on Tuesday nights.

WORLD OF WORK SEMINAR HELD DECEMBER 13

Stuart M. Townsend, District Principal of the Hadley-Luzerne Central School, has announced that the second of series of seminars conducted by the school faculty was held Friday, December 13. The topic under discussion was THE WORLD OF WORK.

The principal speaker was Donald D. Anderson, Mill Manager of the International Paper Company's Hudson River Mill, Corinth, New York. Mr. Anderson was born in Marinette, Wisconsin, and attended schools in Livermore Falls, Maine. He is a graduate of the University of Maine and holds a B. S. degree in chemical engineering. He joined the International Paper Company in 1950 as an assistant chemist at the Ticonderoga Mill. In 1954 he came to the Hudson River Mill as Assistant Sulphite Superintendent. Raising through various managerial positions, Mr. Anderson became Mill Manager in 1966.

Mr. Anderson is the Past President of the Hudson River Mill Technical Association, Member of the Board of Managers of the Adirondack Regional Hospital, Chairman of the Corinth Chapter of the American Red Cross, Member of TAPPI and a Director of the Indian River Company.

Following the main speaker, representatives of area industries met with groups of teachers. These speakers rotated from group to group so that all members of the faculty became acquainted with all areas of work represented. LOCAL ASSOCIATION DISAPPROVES STRIKE ACTION

At a recent meeting of the house of Delegates of NYSTA a resolution was passed authorizing a strike by teachers if legislature did not raise the per pupil aid. The teachers of Hadley-Luzerne do not agree with this action.

Below is the resolution C-1 passed by NYSTA delegates and the resolution subsequently passed by the local association.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

(1) The Hadley-Luzerne Central School Teachers' Association, a bonafide negotiation chapter of the New York State Teachers' Association, go on record as being vigorously and unanimously opposed to the amendment of C-1 Public School Support passed November 25, 1968 by the House of Delegates at Buffalo, New York.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT:

(2) a. The Hadley-Luzerne Central School Teachers' Association make this sentiment known by public announcement in or on any available news media;

b. The local Board of Education be so informed in a written communication;

c. The individual members to personally write the necessary legislators for his district stating the exact position of this organization; and

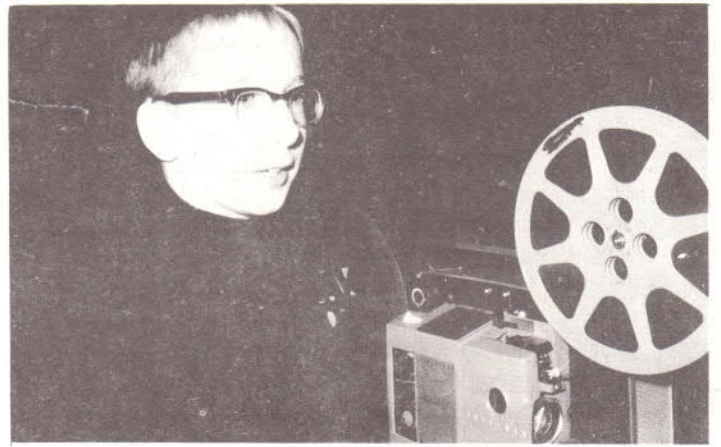
d. N. Y. State Teachers' Association Board of Directors be advised of this position.

AND BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED THAT:

(3) Should a withdrawal of services be implemented by the Board of Directors of New York State Teachers' Association this chapter of NYSTA will not participate and will immediately withdraw from NYSTA.

NOTED: Amendment by addition to C-1

Be it further resolved that the NYSTA Board of Directors be directed to plan and implement any necessary actions including temporary withdrawal of services on a statewide basis after March 1, 1969, but before adjournment of the state legislature should become apparent that the state legislature will not pass on the initial resolve.

FILMS FOR JANUARY AND FEBRUARY ARE ANNOUNCED

As the cold snows of winter blow into our area you won't have to be concerned about what to do for entertainment. The International Paper Foundation in cooperation with Hadley-Luzerne Central School is sponsoring a free film festival. During Saturday evenings in January and February, eleven American and Foreign Films will be shown in the auditorium beginning at 7:30 p.m. each week.

Each of the films scheduled is an award winner. These movies were carefully selected by the project director of the Film Festival, Mr. Donald Racette. In addition the films chosen were reviewed by three area residents to ascertain their worth to the high school students and adults in the vicinity.

Mr. Racette points out that the purpose of the Winter Film Festival is to stimulate an interest in cinema arts through viewing excellent American and Foreign film fare. All movie programs are free and all of them are open to the general public. Mr. Racette cautions, however, that unlike the Summer Film Festival, these upcoming shows are geared for high school students and older people and are not for elementary students. Most of the foreign films, for instance, are in a foreign language with English subtitles. These films are on a caliber with the films shown at many colleges who sponsor foreign film festivals. Mr. Racette says "our interest is to raise the quality of movies on tv and in area movie theaters."

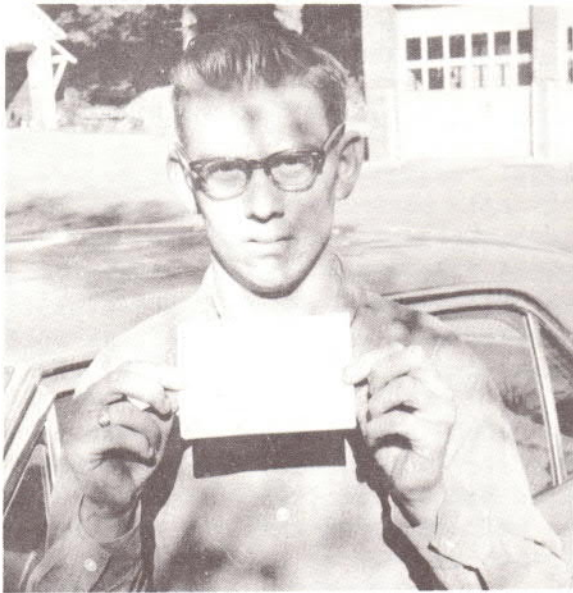

STUDENTS PLAN DAILY MENU

Again this year the sixth grade teachers are engaged in team teaching. Mr. Dickens is teaching science and social studies and Mrs. Mix is teaching math and English.

As a result of a science unit in nutrition, the children in Mrs. Mix class prepared the menu for the week of December 9-13, and Mr. Dicken's class for the week of December 16-20.

In the classroom, nutrition, the basic foods and health were taught. Mrs. Haak, the school dietitian, spoke to each class about preparing school lunches. The classes were then divided into groups; each group preparing a day's menu.

The Christmas meal of sliced turkey, potatoes and gravy, green beans, rolls and butter, cranberry sauce, ice cream sandwiches, and milk, which was served on December 19, was planned by Ronald Wright, Harry Ladd, Guy Gardner and Robert McNamara.

After the menus were planned, Mrs. Mix taught letter writing in English and each student wrote an invitation to his parents inviting them to come to the school and eat lunch on the day the menu planned by their child was being served.

LIBRARY

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Mrs. Enquist spoke of the requirements of a public library, the legal steps necessary, and some of the pitfalls to avoid. From her vast experience across the state, she quoted possibilities to consider in establishing a library. One of the suggestions was the establishment of a committee whose job it would be to study, lay groundwork, and make recommendations to the Town Boards of Hadley and Lake Luzerne about the project.

Miss Harshe spoke of the establishment of two other new public libraries in the area; one in Indian Lake and the other in Mechanicville. The services of SALS which are available to the communities include loan of books, art materials, of prints, paintings, sculpture, records, recordings, films, filmstrips, and tapes, advice on library, etc., and the training of non-professional help for a library.
