Rev. Glenn Dimmitt Presbyterian Church, Lake Luzerne

Rev. Glenn Dimmitt talked on three vital problems that needed immediate attention. 1. The problem of motivation in a home as well as in school. 2. The problem of apathy and what can we do about it. 3. The problem of understanding the nature of our today's community. JENNIFER WAITE NAMED BETTY CROCKER HOMEMAKER OF TOMORROW

Jennifer Waite has been named 1969 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Hadley Luzerne Central School on the basis of a score in a written knowledge and attitude test on homemaking given senior girls December 3.

Jennifer's achievement has made her eligible for state and national scholarships. She also has been awarded a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, sponsor of the Betty Crocker Search for the new American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

A state Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will be selected from the winners of the schools in the state. The state winner will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship, and her school will be awarded a complete set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. The runner-up will be given a \$500 education grant.

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow from this state, together with those from other states and the District of Columbia, each accompanied by a school advisor, will join in an expense paid educational tour of Washington, D.C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va., next spring.

The national winner--the 1969 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow--will be announced at an American Table dinner in Williamsburg. The choice will be on the basis of her original test score plus personal observations and interviews during the tour, and her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000. The second, third, and fourth ranking Homemakers of Tomorrow in the nation will have their original scholarship grants increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

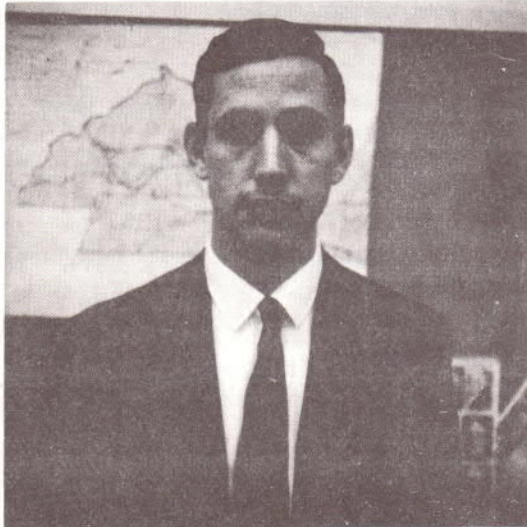

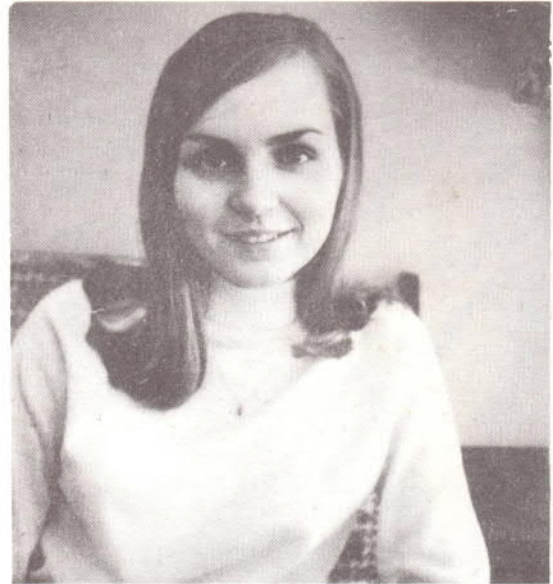
While at college, she was house vice-president, secretary of PiDelta Chi Sorority, and Judiciary Board Executive Council. Her hobby is playing the piano.

This is the 15th year of the Betty Crocker Search, initiated in 1954-55 by General Mills to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. More than six million senior girls have participated in that search program since its inception, and 1,460 winners will have earned scholarships totaling \$1,591,500 at the conclusion of the current program.

The 630,564 girls from 15,116 schools registering for the 1969 Betty Crocker Search established a new record for the program.

Dr. Joseph Loper
Professor, Adirondack Community College

The next guest speaker was Dr. Joseph Loper who emphasized the problem of unrest in our society today. "How long can we go on with this, and can a new establishment be put in the place of our present society?" asked Dr. Loper. He stated that the "social movement" needs strong leaders to operate our society, and felt that the basic problem of today is prejudice or racism. He asked again, "Can we overcome prejudice and can we change attitudes?" He ended with the suggestion that we needed to use self-examination and to change what is fashionable in today's society.

Mr. Loren Brown stressed the growing problem of drug addiction in the community and talked at length on the social and criminal problems that stem from drugs.

Mr. Thomas Lapham gave the audience a clear picture of the experiences that he encounters as he visits the homes on "welfare" in the district. All kinds of problems were cited from loss of jobs to broken homes, all of which bring about serious social problems in the community.

Between skits, the audience was entertained by a chorus consisting of children from the two classes. The chorus was accompanied by Mr. Lefferts.



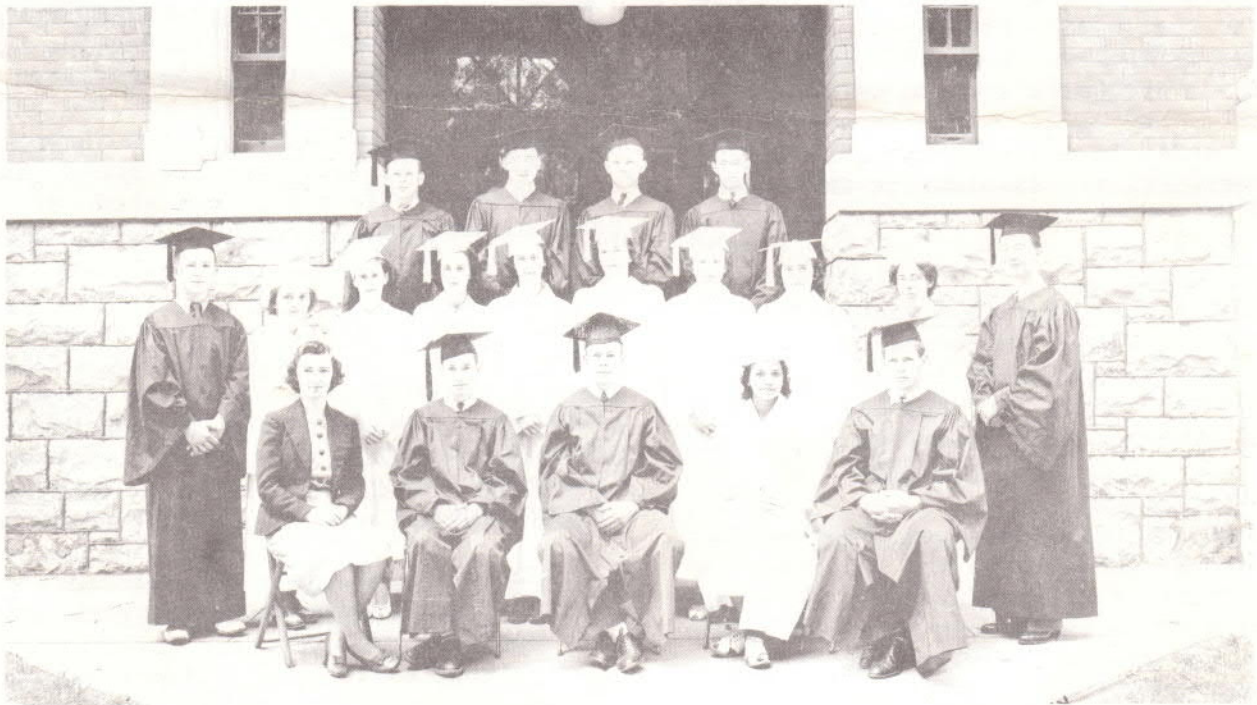
