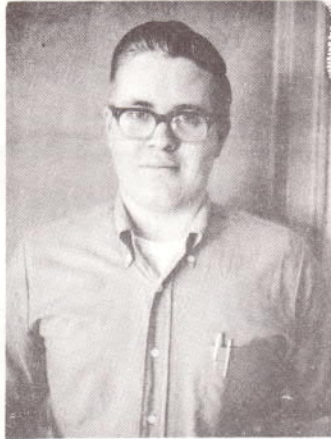

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MOTHERS CLUB SHARE IN A TYPICAL DAY IN THE FIRST DAY

On April 7 the Mothers Club participated in a program presented by the first grade teachers. Opening the evening's activities which took place in one of the first grade rooms, was Mrs. Chris Newton. She explained to the mothers that they would be experiencing "A typical Day in First Grade."

After a brief explanation of the opening activities, such as the pledge and song, Mrs. Newton conducted a language arts activity with the mothers. They were asked to fill different articles in an "It Bag." The mothers were then shown how their children are taught to use complete sentences.

Mrs. Sandy Freeman was next on the program, and she introduced the reading. Each mother was supplied with a special coded reading pre-primer. The mothers were surprised to learn meant Dot: cone; here; and etc. Thus they "began to read" feeling a few of the frustrations that their children experience.

Next was Mrs. Mary Lou Hayes, who led her "students" through an interesting arithmetic lesson. The lesson dealt with the introduction of place holders. She also discussed the importance of their position in a mathematical equation.

The last area covered was science. Miss Lynn Folts handed out materials to make thermometers to the mothers and discussed how a science lesson could be correlated with art (the making of the thermometer) and arithmetic (counting by tens.)

The Mothers Club seemed quite pleased with the "Typical Day in First Grade."

THIRD GRADE SCIENCE PROGRAM EMPHASIZES "FISHING AND UNDER THE SEA ANIMALS"

The activities of the children pictured above are representative of those carried out by members of Mrs. Shattuck's class while doing their "Fishing and Under the Sea Unit."

This project correlates science, social studies, English, and reading. The children made puppets and soap carvings as well as doing research projects. Under the sea collages and water color pictures are expressions of the student's artistic talents. Collections are made of sea shells, fishing pictures and other items having to do with fishing.

At the close of the Unit, various foods from the sea will be prepared and tasted. These will include: sardines, shrimp, tuna, clams, codfish, and many others.

Harold Bradley

The speaker for the evening was Harold Bradley, Director of Service Program, Adirondack Community College. Mr. Bradley was well chosen as the evening's speaker, since he himself has been a basketball coach for 32 years, 12 of which were in high school coaching and 20 years in college coaching at Hartwick, Duke University, and the University of Texas. With never a losing season, he is rated 8th in the nation of active coaches, is a member of the U.S. Olympic Basketball committee, and is a recipient of N.B.A. Coaches Award for 52 wins and has conducted basketball clinics for boys and coaches.

Reminiscing some of the tense moments, fun moments, tragic moments, and the serious moments of various games during his career, Mr. Bradley stressed the values of athletics to boys themselves. He spoke of the physical achievements, scholastic gains, religious and moral achievements which come from wholehearted participation in athletics. Essentially, Mr. Bradley pointed out the obligation parents have to their athletes and the obligations that players have to themselves.

At the opening session on March 3, Mr. Irving Weinstock, Assistant Director of Personnel, New York State, Division of Employment, was principal speaker. He discussed how to get along with people. Since every person is different, one must consider this carefully and deal with each one according to his personality.

Second Session

The second session on March 10 encompassed three areas of importance in managing the school lunch. Time and motion was discussed by use of a skit with a cast of two: Mr. Bert Stiller of Lewis Equipment and Mr. Harold Suckman of ABC Equipment. They talked, demonstrated and showed a film on a new food cutter.

Nutrition and Type A Lunch was discussed by Mrs. Margaret Goldy, Home Economics Teacher at Granville.

For extra functions, Mr. Lewis Hoffis of Chateau de Louis, demonstrated using vegetables as centerpieces. These vegetables were sculptured and dyed to represent flower arrangements for centerpieces. How to use leftovers and utilize vegetables was discussed also.

Final Session

The final session, March 24, included a film "You and Your Machine" from DuBois Chemical Company, which discussed dishwashers in relation to sanitation and sterilization.

Mrs. Barbara Thomas, Instructor Crown Botique Charm School, discussed Charm and Good Grooming. Mrs. Thomas palced the emphasis on good posture, demonstrating correct standing, sitting and walking.
