FACULTY AND INTERNATIONAL PAPER CO. FOUNDATION CO-SPONSOR "SEMINAR ON DRUGS AND NARCOTICS"

The final seminar of the school year was held in the cafeteria on Friday, March 20. This "Seminar on Drugs and Narcotics" was co-sponsored by the faculty and the IPCF.

The IPCF devotes its efforts and financial aid to working through public schools which are in the areas of the various mills. The continuing program of seminars at HLCS is one of the more successful of the activities sponsored by the Foundation.

The chairman of the program was Mr. Armand Gazaille, language teacher at HLCS.

Mr. Thomas Mayone, Investigator affiliated with the Ulster County District Attorney's office was the speaker. Mr. Mayone works very closely with the Ulster County Sheriff's Department and the New York State Police. He has had many years of experience working with drug users and addicts, and this was reflected in the ease with which he acquainted the faculty and guests with a myriad of interesting and important aspects of the problem of drugs and narcotics.

The program began with a welcome from Mr. Stuart Townsend, District Principal and from Mrs. Madeleine Beattie, member of the Board of Education.

The "creative writing" class completed an experimental unit of creativity in form of a TRILOGY. Students divided the program into categories of music, art and creative writing. Beethoven's Symphony in C Minor played by the New York Philharmonic was the first to inspire some artistic endeavor in a "mood" drawing. From the evaluation of the individual picture, the group was able to discuss each others reaction to the particular type of music. Then a quality paper of this mood was written and again shared for individual comments. The second week was devoted to THE BALLET. We chose SADLER'S WELLS BALLET--TCHAIKOVSKY'S SLEEPING BEAUTY, recorded in England. Again listening, drawing and writing were evaluated and inspired. The third segment was devoted to ROCK MUSIC and shared as a unit. Our final portion of the program brought two teachers into the BALLAD or FOLK MUSIC picture which was introduced by two members of the class. We were fortunate to listen and discuss Russian "folk" music and culture as well as French traditional folk lore.

FOLK MUSIC BY MALCOM WELLER

For an unplanned concert, last Thursday's Creative Writing class turned out to be quite an unforgettable experience into the depths of folk music.

My most intriguing thought was my lack of understanding; could Folk music from the other lands, of different tongues, of different backgrounds, be so different from our Folk lore? I went into the classroom searching for contrast and came out amazed! Although there was contrast in presentation due to circumstances, there was no difficulty in communications that I anticipated.

Expression was the keynote to understanding; I understood the feelings of the singer and even visually portrayed the context of the folk song. As though I could speak the tongue, everything became transparent right before my eyes and ears. The thoughts behind the "folk music" are universal. All men have a means of expressing their thoughts, their dreams, their miseries, and their memories. Some of us are talented to write to express ourselves in poetry. Others have their say in mass-media and the simple humming of tunes are oft-times carried down from generation to generation as a means of communication between past and present.

The expressions may be happy memories, heartily sung about all the joys and pleasures in life, while others express the uselessness, the destruction, and the unhappiness equated with war.

However heartbreaking or beautiful the "folk song" is a universal method of communication, expressed or shared by every mortal.

EGG HATCHING IN GRADE 5

Mr. Meyer's Fifth Grade class prepared for the rebirth and resurrection of plant and animal life of spring this year when nine chicken eggs and three duck eggs were placed into a borrowed 4-H incubator on March 3. This and other materials obtained from the 4-H office in Saratoga helped make the project more profitable for the students. Colored slides and charts were shown and discussed at the inception of the project. In addition to these materials, two of the incubated chicken eggs were opened during the 21 day incubation period to further illustrate development of a growing embryo.

March 23 and 24 were the big days. What an experience to have traced the development of these embryos from single white cells to a baby chick struggling to break forth into the world! At this point, the question was asked, "Is it fair for those of us living now to so pollute the environment of these tiny chicks and all other newborn creatures that their future health and lives are endangered?"

HADLEY-LUZERNE STUDENTS VISIT
MACHINE SHOP AND AUTOMOTIVE CLASSES

Forty-four industrial arts students from Hadley-Luzerne recently visited the machine shop, auto mechanics and auto body repair classes of the Saratoga-Warren County BOCES Occupational Education program at the Saratoga Springs Center. The students were accompanied by their instructors, Mr. Thomas Roach and Mr. Darrell Finlayson.

At the machine shop, the students had the opportunity to gain first hand information about the class by observing and talking with the machine shop students and Mr. Lawrence Estill, machine shop instructor. Demonstrations on the various operations involved in machine shop work were presented by the students. Completed drawings and jobs on display gave the students a better understanding of the work of the machinist. The students observed work being done on several engines in various stages of overhaul in the auto mechanics class. In the auto body shop, work was being done on jobs varying from a small dent in a fender to a total wreck.

By being able to visit the vocational courses, the students gained knowledge that may help those who wish to more appropriately elect a vocational course during their high school years. The Saratoga-Warren District of BOCES Occupational Program currently offers 15 courses to over 600 students from the school districts in Saratoga and Warren Counties. Schools participating in the program are Ballston Spa, Corinth, Galway, Hadley-Luzerne, Mechanicville, Saratoga Springs, Schuylerville, Shenepohowa, South Glens Falls, Stillwater and at Waterford-Halfmoon. Courses are presently conducted in rented facilities in Saratoga Springs and at Schuylerville and Shenepohowa Schools.

In September 1970, the new BOCES building will be completed at Henning Road, Saratoga. This building will provide an up-to-date facility for vocational education with a capacity of 1100 students.

PARENTS OF EIGHTH GRADERS ATTEND CONFERENCE

A large group of parents attended the annual 8th grade orientation conference on Monday, March 9 at the school.

The program was introduced by Stuart M. Townsend, District Principal, who explained the education opportunities for all students.

Mr. H. J. Edwards, Personnel Manager at the International Paper Company gave a vivid description of the needs of industry with its technical changes. The new method of production requires the laborer to be a more skillful individual. He must have a high school education to compete with the rapid changes in technology.

Mr. Martin Munson, BOCES Guidance Coordinator, reviewed the new occupational classes at Saratoga Springs and the different courses of study offered. He invited the parents to visit the school this coming Fall.

Mr. Leonard Gereau, High School Principal, explained the new requirements for graduation, while Mr. John J. Castle, Guidance Director, reviewed the student handbook and the courses of study handbook.
